

The prospect of having to leave the safety of a transit shelter in Kuala Lumpur looms large for three rescued homeless men. StarMetro revisits them in the second part of this special series

SPACIOUS, breezy, orderly and peaceful. This best describes the atmosphere at

Anjung Kelana, a transformation centre in Taman Danau Desa, Kuala Lumpur, set up by the Federal Territories Ministry for the homeless to receive job skills training. The centre is where those who have been

The centre is where those who have been rescued from the streets are sent to after their mental and physical states are evaluated.

The residents here are taught farming, tailoring and woodworking.

After three months, they are expected to leave the centre, return to the outside world—ideally with their confidence and vigour to rejoin society restored—and fend for themselves.

However, not everyone who goes to the centre is ready to leave after the stipulated

In that case, they can apply for an exten-

sion but the applications will be considered

sion but the applications will be considered on a case-by-case basis by Kuala Lumpur City Hall (DBKL), which runs the centre. The three men whom StarMetro featured in part one of our special series focused on the Anjung Kelana residents, have stayed on

at the centre.

Basri Yanna, 45, has been at the centre for

Basri Yanna, 45, has been at the centre for more than six months while Chandran Ratnam, 73, and Hiew Jia Hua, 40, have been there for no less than four months. StarMetro first met them a month ago. On our second visit, the men share their thoughts about the prospect of leaving the safety of the centre to face the outside world.

Living a simple life

"The outside world is certainly livelier than my current existence at the centre," said Hiew.

"However, it is also full of uncertainties," he admitted.

At the centre, residents get five meals a day and enjoy a comfortable living environ-

In the mornings, they get to work on the

In the mornings, they get to work on the urban farm there.

For participating in the farming programme, Hiew said he was paid RM3 a day. In a week, he can earn up to RM20. For volunteering in the December postflood clean-up missions in Dengkil and Karak over five days, he received about RM300.

The full-day sessions saw him clearing water-damaged items and carrying them to rubbish dumpsters from affected buildings. "I do not need much money. Just cash for

handphone top-ups, instant noodles and cigarettes.
"As we cannot go out, there is no real need

for me to earn much money," said Hiew. He preferred to live simply, he said, as this meant not having to deal with work stress or family life.

On whether he missed having a social life, he said he learned not to expect too much.

"I had a girlfriend six years ago and she stayed with me at my family's house in

Semenyih for a year.
"The relationship ended when I went to prison.

"Now, I do not have many friends. I realise people in my situation are not popular," he

But Hiew refuses to feel sorry for himself. "Whether one is happy or sad, life will still

"Whether one is happy or sad, life will stil go on. So why be sad when you can choose to be happy?
"Let go of your burdens and worries. The decision is up to you.
"It is all about learning to appreciate sim-ple pleasures," he advised.
Seeing his mustard greens and ladies' fin-gers grow at the transit centre's farm is one of those simple pleasures.

"It is not instant gratification but seeing the vegetables I planted grow day by day, really gives me a lot of joy and satisfaction," he said. If he has to leave the centre, Hiew said he would adjust.

"Not many people would experi-ence what I went through. "Serving time in prison and liv-

ing on the streets have turned me into a survivor. "This is the one advantage I have

over others, so no matter the cir-cumstances, I will survive," he declared.

declared.
On what he intended to do to be self-sufficient, Hiew said he had faith in the kindness of people.
"I am sure I would not have to walk far before meeting a kind soul," he said, stressing that it was important not to worry too much about what tomorrow might bring, "When I was living on the streets, I was satisfied as soon as I had RM200 in my pocket.

streets, I was satisfied as soon as I had RM200 in my pocket, "I would only start thinking about my next move when I was down to my last RM30. "If I needed new shoes for exam-

ple, I would just buy a new pair and give my old one to another

street person.
"This is the kind of outlook that has kept me going all this time," he

Potential job opportunity

Basri is turning the knob on his new radio when a kitten rubs up against his calf and gave a soft

Satisfied that he has found the frequency of his favourite channel, he picks up the cat and pets it gen-

tly.
"I have been looking after this one since she was a few weeks old," he said of the kitten.

"At night, she sleeps on my bed. I feel responsible for these critters," he added.

Basri has been using his meagre income from working at the farm and preparing craftwork orders at the workshop to buy cat food. He hoped the craft shop owner

in Chow Kit, who has been commissioning the products from him, would hire him permanently.

"I heard he was looking for a

room for me.

"Once suitable accommodation is found, I will move out of this place," he said.

A former convict, Basri has had a rough life.

His parents died when he was an infant and he was taken in by a family who claimed to be a friend

of his late father. He never went to school "I learned to read from friends. My adoptive siblings went to school

but I did not. "I have lost contact with my fam-

"I tried looking for them in Seremban but discovered that they had moved and I could not locate

them," he said.

Despite being on the receiving

end of this curve ball, Basri remained steadfast in his faith. "When life gets hard, I think of it

as a challenge.

did not happen because her par-ents disapproved of me. "After that, I sort of gave up on dating and never tried again. "I realise that I am a nobody. No

one will want someone like me who is jobless and an ex-convict.
"But I am determined to better

myself and prove that I can be someone useful to society," he said.

Fit for his age

The oldest resident in Anjung Kelana, former lorry driver Chandran dreams of getting behind the wheel again, be it driving lor-ries or school vans.

But his advanced age means that most employers are not keen to

hire him.
"When I attend job interviews,
all they say is they will call me
back. I know what that means.
"I am not asking for handouts
from anyone. All I want is a job so I
can support myself," he said.
Chandran felt upset when he

looked at other residents at the homeless centre.
"I have 30 years over these people but what do I have to show for it? I am a nobody," he said.
A former drug addict, Chandran cut ties with his family years ago and has no plans to require with and has no plans to reunite with them anytime soon. "My sisters are still alive. They

are all grandmothers now.
"I disappointed them a lot in the past, so maybe it is best that I stay

away,
"If I go back to my family, it may cause a lot of pain and I do not want to trouble them again," he

Like Basri, Chandran never felt like blaming God. "I always believe in being thank-ful for what one has and God has plans for me.





TWO years ago, Sabariah Mahmud, 62, a home-based micro entrepreneur, sold curry

puffs at 40sen a piece.

Last month, the mother-of-two who lives in a low-cost flat in Wangsa Maju, Kuala Lumpur decided to increase the price of the curry puffs, which came in three varieties -potato, sardine and chicken, to 50sen a

Not all her customers were happy with

the 10sen hike of her curry puffs.
"I did not want to increase the price as I understand that people are struggling with

the rising cost of living.

"But I had no choice as the prices of almost everything went up. I have to earn an income too," she said.

The Covid-19 pandemic and subsequent

restrictions imposed to curb its transmission have massively disrupted the supply chain, resulting in rising prices of necessi-

While experts deliberate on the macroeconomic aspects, ordinary folk like Sabariah, and other low-income house holds, are already feeling the brunt of high cost of basic necessities.

In the Federal Territories, at least 6,100 households are considered poor and 4,500

are hardcore poor, according to the National Poverty Data Bank System (eKasih). A poor household is one that earns less

than RM2,208 a month while the hardcore poor earns less than RM1,169 monthly.

Kuala Lumpur topped both categories with 4,051 poor and 3,865 hardcore poor households, while Labuan has 1,605 poor and 654 hardcore poor homes.

Putrajaya, despite its status as the administrative capital of Malaysia, also has its fair share of poor households at 67 and eight

are in the hardcore poor category.
Federal Territories Ministry secretarygeneral Datuk Seri Rosida Jaafar said the
ministry was paying serious attention to the

urban poverty issue.

She said the ministry spent RM151.3mil since the start of the pandemic on initiatives to uplift the needy involving 530,000 people in Kuala Lumpur, Putrajaya and Labuan.

Among the initiatives were MyGrocer@ Wilayah, MyFood@Wilayah, MyJob@ Wilayah, MySchoolBus@Wilayah and MyMedic@Wilayah.

"Through the MyFood@Wilayah initia-tive, some 100,000 food baskets were distributed, especially to residents of public (PA) and people's housing projects (PPR).

Observing Qing Ming with caution

THOSE who paid respects to their ancestors and deceased family members for Qing Ming at Kwong members for Qing Ming at Kwong Tong Cemetery (KTC) Kuala Lumpur over the weekend were told to limit their group to a maximum of eight, keep their rituals short and offerings simple as well as clean up after themselves.

Kwong Tong Cemetery Management Kuala Lumpur Association has also set a time limit of 90 minutes at cemeteries and 60 minutes for prayers at the pagoda area (which houses the columbarium).

The pagoda's indoor area is closed on weekends and tomorrow, which is the actual day of Qing Ming, as the association said

Qing Ming, as the association said there were more people and it would be difficult to observe physical distancing.

Derran Liew said the standard

operating procedure (SOP) was easy to follow, even though he learnt about them only upon

"We were able to enter the pagoda and see his urn during pre-pandemic times so we are a

bit sad that we cannot do it now, said the 32-year-old from Ampang "However, our Qing Ming ritual

"We offered some of my late father's favourite food like nasi lemak."

Sisters-in-law Yvonne Yong and Jess Lim said their family brought fewer offerings and reduced their prayer duration when restrictions were imposed last year. "The one-hour limit for prayers at the pagoda area is enough," said

Yong felt that the association's

Yong felt that the association's advice to keep offerings simple and clean up after the rituals was practical and easy to follow.

Qing Ming, also known as Tomb Sweeping Day, is when Chinese families clean grave sites to commemorate their ancestors and honour those who have passed away. The festival's peak season is

between March 19 and April 17, with more people expected to head to cemeteries and columbariums this month now that Malaysia is

It was reported that the SOP for Funeral Affairs for Non-Muslim Persons limited grave visiting to a maximum of 20 persons.

Those above 60 and children below 12 are discouraged from participating in the rituals.

"Our committee has been promoting the "Go Green Qing Ming Tomb Sweeping Campaign" over the past few years in an effort to reduce waste," said Yong, adding that offerings should be kept simple with fruits, flowers and tea.

"Visitors are encouraged to visit KTC on weekdays to prevent overcrowding," said Yong, adding that most visitors were compliant.

"Families now come in smaller groups and we do not allow hawk-

Framules now come in smaller groups and we do not allow hawkers here to reduce crowding.

"We also urge visitors to be respectful of people's privacy and not shoot videos and upload them on social media." he said.

ity.


Rosli also noted that the number of Ramadan bazaar fors in Kuala Lumpur had dropped by 40%.

"This could be a result of people preferring to run their food delivery business from home," he said

He added that prime locations such as Masjid India, Lorong Tuanku Abdul Rahman and UTC Sentul would continue to draw a crowd.

Meanwhile, Food Bank Meanwhile, Food Bank Foundation Malaysia chief execu-tive officer Ab Wahab Long said there must be better coordination between government agencies, NGOs and soup kitchens when dis-tributing food. "There has to be a designated food distribution centre where

Eatery in Taman Puchong Utama ordered to close

SUBANG Jaya City Council (MBS) conducted a joint operation on food premises to check on compliance within the commercial area of Taman Puchong Utama in Puchong, Selangor.

A total of 56 staff from MBSJ's health, enforcement, licensing and environmental management as well as its corporate and strategic management departments were involved.

In a statement, MBSJ said 68 food premises in Jalan PU 7/3 and Jalan PU 7/4 were inspected.

One eatery was ordered to close immediately after it was found to have violated conditions of its business licence and obtained.

evaluation).

MBSJ said 11 compound notices were issued for various offences, comprising violations under

Section 15 of the 2007 (MBSJ) Food Section 15 of the 2007 (MBS)) Fo Establishment by-law for not properly maintaining premises; Section 9 of the Food Handlers by-law for staff without typhoid

Section 9 of the Foot Handles by-law for staff without typhoid jabs, Collection and Rubbish Disposal by-law for not having a closed and properly maintained rubbish bin; and Advertising by-law for putting up advertisements without a licence.

There were also violations under Trade Licensing, Business and Industry by-law for violating licence requirements and Section 46 of the (MBS) Street, Drainage and Building Act 1944 for obstructing public access, "MBS] will continue to carry our periodic monitoring at commercial areas within its jurisdiction. "Business owners are advised to always follow rules," said MBSJ.

"Some 23,000 households also received a monthly assistance in the form of a 5kg bag of rice throughout 2021," she said. Rosida noted that under MyGrocer@

Wilayah, four trucks selling groceries were sent to 49 locations, mostly PA and PPR areas. "The items in these trucks are sold at pric-

es that are between 5% and 20% cheape than the usual market price," she added.

Amid the economic uncertainty caused by the pandemic, many companies opted to trim their workforce as part of a cost-cutting

measure.

Many people became jobless in a matter of weeks, sparking concerns about widening inequality and of households slipping from the M40 category into the B40 group.

Rosida said low qualifications, reliance on only one income source and limited access to

affordable housing were among factors trap-ping a person in poverty.

MyJob@Wilayah, a job-matching pro-gramme, offered 86,000 jobs in construction, maintenance, cleaning, packaging, manufac-turing and service sectors. "The Social Security Organisation helped to

identify prospective employers and set up job interviews," she noted.

One such programme held at PPR Desa Rejang in Setiawangsa on Feb 26 this year, drew 145 jobseekers.

Eight from that group secured a job while another 84 qualified for a second interview,

"Meanwhile, 465 trading kiosks in Kuala Lumpur and 99 in Putrajaya were given to young entrepreneurs to do business.

"We are targeting to allocate up to 1,000 such kiosks at strategic locations within this

year," she explained.

Rosida also said a pilot project was set to launch at PPR Kerinchi in Pantai Dalam this month, aimed at tackling poverty. Under a partnership with the private sec-

tor, Economic Planning Unit, Kuala Lumpur City Hall (DBKL) and community leaders, the project would see 70 residents being recruit-ed and trained to become micro entrepre-

neurs.

"Participants are chosen based on data
"Participants are chosen based on data provided via the eKasih registry," she said, adding that they would be coached on marketing strategies, in addition to receiving training and equipment.

The business types include food and bever-

age, groceries, car workshops, nursery and alternative treatments, as well as beauty and care services.

Last year, the ministry, through its Bumiputra Economic Empowerment Programme, spent RM1.97mil training aspir-

ing entrepreneurs.
Some 180 people, most of whom were residents of PPR and PA benefited from the initiative, which also included an initial capital injection.

Each participant received between RM10,000 and RM20,000 and their target was to make a profit of between RM2,000 and RM6,000 within the first few months of oper-

Under the MyMedic@Wilayah initiative, some 7,400 PPR and PA residents benefited from its free basic medical consultation as of last December.

With 264 sessions being held at 16 loca-tions last year, Rosida said it aimed to help lighten the financial burden in terms of medical cost.

"Meanwhile, under MySchool@Wilayah, 11.500 students from low and medium-cost housing received free transport to school by bus," she said.

Among the locations covered were PA and PPR homes, DBKL workers' quarters and nurseries under the Welfare Department.

KL's hardcore poor shot up by 270% after pandemic

THE number of hardcore poor in Kuala Lumpur shot up by nearly 270% over two

Data from the Federal Territories Ministry showed that there were 3.865 hardcore poor families in 2021 compared to only 1,048 in

According to the national poverty stand-ard, a household is considered hardcore poor

if their monthly income is below RM1,169.

The number of poor families in the same period also showed a drastic 41% increase, going from 2,871 in 2019 to 4,051 last year.

A poor household is one whose monthly income is below RM2,208, after a revision in 2020 which previously saw the figure at

Putrajaya, meanwhile, recorded a more than 20-fold climb in the number of poor households, from only three in 2019 to 67

Labuan followed a similar pattern, with a 170% surge, from 593 households in 2019 to 1,605 in 2021.

1,605 in 2021.

Its population of hardcore poor also swelled by some 300%, going from 163 in 2019 to 654 last year.

The number of poor and hardcore poor in the Federal Territories is expected to soar again next year when the poverty

line is revised. On March 7, Minister in the Prime Minister's Department (Economy) Datuk Seri Mustapa Mohamed told the Dewan Rakyat that this might take place in the first quarter

He said the government, under the 12th Malaysia Plan, was committed to eradicating hardcore poverty.

Malaysia's poverty rate, he noted, had changed significantly in the last five decades, owing to overall economic growth and the New Economic Policy.

"However, the country continues to face several challenges, such as the poor who still exist in urban and rural areas, as well as in Orang Asli settlements.

"The issue of low wages, as well as regional inequality, coupled with the impacts of the

an nequanty, outpied with the impacts of the Covid-19, have impacted household income," Mustapa was quoted as saying. On March 28, Deputy Federal Territories Minister Datuk Seri Jalaluddin Alias told Dewan Negara that a unit had been set up under the ministry to address the rising urban poverty issue.

He said a task force would be formed to supply essential goods to the needy in view of the upcoming Hari Raya Aidil Fitri. — By FARID WAHAB

Two anglers rescued after being adrift in waters off Labuan

LABUAN: Two siblings who were reported missing while out fishing in waters off Semarang here on Saturday have been found safe and sound.

Muhammad Nuhidayat Jafari, 18, and his brother Muhammad Nabil, 22, were rescued by a team from the Labuan Malaysian Maritime Enforcement Agency (MMEA) yesterday morning.

Labuan Zone Maritime chief maritime Captain Nurdin Jusoh said the duo set out to sea around 5am on Saturday, but their boat's engine malfunctioned when they were fishing.

He said they only managed to make a distress call to their mother at 8.40am yesterday and she immediately alerted the MMEA.

The search-and-rescue team comprising personnel from the marine police, navy, and Fire and Rescue Department located their boat soon after that and brought them to safety, he added.

"The two siblings attempted to get help from other anglers in the vicinity, but to no avail as their boat had to be towed to shore," he said. **Bernama**
